
























Honours Series VI Nature's Beauty

This texts for this work come from three English haiku written by Calvin Olsen. The three main sections of the work take haiku that best describe a river, a storm, and calming winds. The music of this work utilises a lot of naturalistic sounds such as bird calls or wind sounds to depict the scenes that the haiku are describing, twisting around the words. From this the primary compositional technique of this work is seen. The focal technique of this work is the use of non-lyrical material, such as the previously mentioned natural sounds.

Sounds on notes in 'Part 1' with accents should be overaccented for dramatic effect - exact pitch on these notes may be ignored when no singable with certain sounds

Each bar section of the work should be approx.

twenty-five seconds long, with all durations in parts
following this guide - these durations are all suggested and
may be altered as a conductor deems appropriate

Dynamics are left to the discretion of the conductor and choristers, however, 'Part 1' should be in the aural foreground as the melody and 'Part 6' in the background as a drone
